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Bee's arrival gets Arbor Rose and Jerome Home buzzing

It took more than two years for the newest resident of Arbor Rose and Jerome Home to arrive but the wait was worth it for the community. The six-foot-tall "Welcome Bee" Fiberglas statue positioned outside the front entrance brings smiles to residents, staff and visitors alike, many taking selfies with the colorful character. "Families and residents have been enjoying being 'greeted' by the bee," said Denise Lebrocquy, retirement counselor, Arbor Rose at Jerome Home.

The community decided to sponsor a bee when the City of New Britain and Greater New Britain Arts Alliance announced the "Bees Across New Britain" project in August 2017. The public art display is similar to West Hartford's "Cow Parade" that was popular a decade See Bee on page 3

Arbor Rose is 'going green'

As an environmentalist, doing my part to protect our planet has long been a passion of mine. I am an avid recycler, contribute to environmental as well as animal rights causes and often support online petitions. But I wanted to do more.

Approximately 18 billion pounds of plastic waste flows into the oceans every year. That's the equivalent of five grocery bags of plastic trash sitting on every foot of coastline around the world. It's choking our oceans, poisoning our food and water supply, and wreaking havoc on the health and well-being of humans and wildlife worldwide. Plastic takes anywhere from 500 to 1,000 years to

degrade, so one can argue

that every piece of it ever produced, except for what has been incinerated, is still in existence. These sobering statistics should be a huge wake-up call to all of us.

I shared what I learned with some of our residents and was amazed at how interested and engaged they were. They all had the same question: "What can we do to help?" The answer was right under our noses. I have been the activities director at Arbor Rose for almost 10 years and like many organizations, we use a tremendous amount of plastic products.

I quickly realized that I couldn't make changes on my own, so I approached a few colleagues with my concerns and found them to be very receptive to making a positive change. In July, we formed a Green Committee with the goal to eliminate Styrofoam and plastic use.

During our first meeting we discussed the challenges we face and how to begin making changes. Within dining services, we began using china dishes, eliminating plastic for most uses. We have substituted foam coffee cups with cardboard and are using metal and glass serve those living with dementia.

condiment and salad dressing cups instead of plastic.

It's a good start but we still have a long way to go. Some things we are working on:

- Switching to paper medication cups
- Using paper cups or using washable cups
- Using wooden coffee stirrers
- Supplying reusable shopping bags to residents to be used on our weekly shopping trips
- Staff education: Possibly hosting in-services on the proper use of recycling bins and why it's vital that we all do our part

But clearly, we all need to do more. The United States recycles just 9 percent of its plastic trash. Plastic has become such a normal part of our everyday lives that we often don't realize how much we use or how unnecessary it is. It is up to each and every one of us to be mindful and make the positive changes necessary to save our planet. What will you do?

The statues, which were designed by sculptor Craig Frederick, tie in with New Britain's ongoing bee theme including the City of New Britain seal which features a beehive, seven bees representing local industries, and the Latin phrase, "Industry fills the hive and enjoys the honey." Bee vignettes have been popping up throughout the city including a beehive pattern across a bridge that spans Route 72. Each statue has been decorated differently to represent the sponsor or setting. Valentin Jr. - who met with Arbor Rose and Jerome Home staff to learn more about the community - was inspired by Augustus Jerome, the founder of Jerome Home, which he represented with half-frame glasses and spats.

Our bee was one of the first eight that were unveiled in a public ceremony in May. Other apian insects that have been spotted include a Tourist Bee outside a travel agency and the "A Bee C D" sculpture for the school system.
